ELECTION DATES AND DEADLINES

NEW MEXICO GENERAL ELECTIONS Tuesday, November 5, 2024

Winners serve as our elected officials.

Important deadlines:

- Complete a voter registration form online by October 8.
- To **vote by mail, (absentee ballot)**, your application must be received by the County Clerk's office by **October 22.*** Mail in your voter registration form postmarked by **October 8**.
- To **vote early and in person**, your application must be received by the County Clerk's office by **October 8 to November 2.** (See next page about expanded early voting.)

*Mail-in ballots must be returned by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day. Request an application here: https://www.sos.state.nm.us/voting-and-elections/voting-faqs/absentee-voting-by-mail/.

MAKE YOUR VOTE COUNT!

Step 1: Are you eligible to vote? Generally, you are eligible if you are:

- √ At least 18 (by Election Day)
- √ A citizen of the United States
- √ A New Mexico resident

People with felony convictions can vote even if they are on parole or probation.





Step 2: Are you registered with current information?

You MUST be registered to vote! Check to see if you are registered and if your information is up to date at: https://voterportal.servis.sos.state.nm.us/WhereToVote.aspx

STEP 1: REGISTER TO VOTE

REGISTER ONLINE:

To register online, visit: https://portal.sos.state.nm.us/OVR/WebPages/InstructionsStep1.aspx?ref=voteusa. Your Social Security Number, driver's license number, and date of birth must match information on file with the New Mexico Motor Vehicle Division. If you don't have a state ID, you must register by mail or in person.

REGISTER BY MAIL:

Print this form: https://portal.sos.state.nm.us/OVR/VRForms/VRFormEnglishFinal.pdf.

You can register to vote by completing a voter registration form and mailing it to your County Clerk's office. Individuals can print out a Voter Registration Form (available here: (https://portal.sos.state.nm.us/OVR/(S(hwzs5tvnusbzkrrm3mjcufdq))/VRForms/VRFormEnglishFinal.pdf) or request that a Voter Registration Form be mailed to them by contacting their County Clerk's office. When returning a completed voter registration form by mail, and registering to vote for the first time you must include a copy of (1) a current and valid photo ID; or (2) a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, student ID card, or any other government document that shows your name and current address. If you are registering to vote for the first time and do not enclose a copy of one of these forms of ID, you will be required to present the ID when voting in person or by absentee ballot.

REGISTER IN PERSON:

You may register to vote in person at your County Clerk's office or at any polling location in your county on Election Day. New Mexico has "same day voter registration" which allows any eligible voter to register to vote or update their registration immediately before casting their ballot in a statewide election during Early Voting or on Election Day. If you are taking advantage of same-day voter registration you must provide a physical form of identification that is issued by the federal government, a state government, a federally recognized Indian Nation, Tribe, or Pueblo, or an educational institution and that: (1) contains your name, which matches the name provided on the certificate of registration; (2) contains your photograph; and (3) either (a) contains an address that matches the address provided for the certificate of registration, or (b) is accompanied by an original or copy of a utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other document issued by an educational institution or government, including a document issued by a federally recognized Indian Nation, Tribe, or Pueblo, dated within the 90 days prior to you registering to vote or updating your existing registration and that contains the name of the elector and address matching what is provided on the certificate of registration.

STEP 2: GO VOTE

EARLY VOTING:

Expanded early voting is available in many counties beginning the third Saturday before the elections.

SAME-DAY VOTER REGISTRATION:

You can register to vote or update your existing registration and vote on the same day at your County Clerk's office. Some County Clerks will offer additional same-day voter registration locations at expanded early voting sites, too.

To register and vote on the same day, you should bring one of the following:

- 1. A New Mexico driver's license or New Mexico identification card issued through the Motor Vehicle Division of the Taxation and Revenue department;
- 2. Any document that contains an address in the county together with a photo identification card; or

3. A current valid student photo identification card from a post-secondary educational institution in New Mexico accompanied by a current student fee statement that contains the student's address in the county.

VOTER ID REQUIREMENTS:

You are not required to present identification to vote in a statewide election when you registered in advance, unless you did not provide a qualifying ID when you registered. For example, when people register by mail but do not include ID copies. If you did not provide ID when you registered, bring one of the forms of ID listed above under "register by mail" when you go to vote.

RETURNING BALLOTS FOR OTHERS:

Only the voter or a caregiver or immediate family member can return a voter's ballot. Voters must complete, seal, and sign their own ballots before a caregiver or family member returns it.
