ELECTION DATES AND DEADLINES

WASHINGTON GENERAL ELECTIONS

Tuesday, November 5, 2024

Winners serve as our elected officials.

Important deadlines:

- **If registering online**, you must register to vote by **October 28** by 11:59 p.m.
- **If registering by mail**, your voter registration form must be received by **October 28**, close of business.
- You can also **register in person** during early voting between **October 18 to November 5**.
- Washington also allows for same-day voter registration. You can register in person at a vote center on Election Day, November 5.
- Your ballot will be mailed to you at least 18 days before each election.
- Your completed ballot must either be postmarked no later than Election Day or returned to a ballot drop box by 8:00 p.m. on Election Day. If mailing your ballot within a week of Election Day, be mindful of mailbox collection times or use an official ballot drop box. A late postmark could disqualify your ballot.

*Washington votes by mail every election. If you are registered to vote in Washington, there is no need to request a ballot. Confirm your registration at VoteWA.gov.



MAKE YOUR VOTE COUNT!

Step 1: Are you eligible to vote?

Generally, you are eligible if you are:

- ✓ At least 18 (by Election Day)
- ✓ A citizen of the United States
- ✓ A resident of Washington
- ✓ Not disqualified from voting due to court order

If you have a felony conviction in WA, your right to vote will be restored automatically & you can vote if you are not serving a sentence of total confinement in prison.

If you have a felony conviction in another state or federal court, your right to vote is restored automatically & you can vote so long as you are not currently incarcerated.

STEP 1: REGISTER TO VOTE

REGISTER ONLINE:

Register online at: [VoteWA.gov](https://www.vote.wa.gov)

You will need: Your Washington State driver's license or ID (see below for specific ID requirements).

REGISTER IN PERSON OR BY MAIL:

You can **register in person** at your County Elections Office. Find your County Elections Office: <https://www.sos.wa.gov/elections/voters/voter-registration/county-elections-offices>.

To register by mail, print out this form: <https://www.sos.wa.gov/elections/voters/voter-registration/print-voter-registration-form>. You also can request to have a voter registration form mailed to you at <http://sos.wa.gov/elections> or by calling (800) 448-4881. You can choose to return that form by mail or in person at your County Elections Office.

SAME-DAY REGISTRATION:

Eligible voters in Washington have until 8:00 p.m. on an Election Day to register to vote or update registration information in person at a voting center or County Elections Office. The deadline for registrations or updates by mail or online has been moved from 29 days to eight days prior to an election.

STEP 2: GO VOTE

ABSENTEE/MAIL-IN VOTING:

Washington votes by mail every election. If you are registered to vote in Washington, there is no need to request a ballot. Confirm your registration at [VoteWA.gov](https://www.vote.wa.gov). Return your ballot by official drop box or by mail, no stamp needed. Your ballot must be deposited or postmarked by Election Day. If mailed, the USPS (<https://www.sos.wa.gov/usps-and-election-mail-resources>) recommends that you mail a week before Election Day. EARLY AND IN-PERSON VOTING:

You can vote in person starting 18 days before an election through Election Day. Find your voting center by logging into [VoteWA.gov](https://www.vote.wa.gov) or by contacting your County Elections Office. If you're already registered, you don't need to provide an ID.

VOTER ID REQUIREMENTS:

A person will need a Washington driver's license, permit, state ID number, or last four digits of their Social Security Number in order to complete the voter registration form. Applicants without any of these standard IDs may leave this section blank but will be asked for alternative ID by their County Elections Office before the registration can be approved.

Your signature on the ballot declaration or provisional ballot must match your voter registration record or you must provide a valid (not expired) photo ID such as:

- Driver's license
- State ID card
- Student ID card
- Tribal ID card
- Employer ID card
- US Passport

VOTING RIGHTS RESTORATION:

Your right to vote is restored automatically once you are no longer serving a sentence of total confinement in prison for your felony conviction. You do not lose the right to vote for a misdemeanor conviction or a conviction in juvenile court.

FUTURE VOTER PROGRAM:

In Washington state, 16- and 17-year-olds can sign up as future voters and be automatically registered to vote when they become eligible. A voter who turns 18 between the August primary and the November general election can vote in the primary. You can sign up for Future Voter online at VoteWA.gov using your driver's license, permit, or state ID.

RETURNING BALLOTS FOR OTHERS:

If you cannot personally return your ballot, let only people you trust deliver it for you.
