## ELECTION DATES AND DEADLINES

### ARIZONA GENERAL ELECTION

**Tuesday, November 5, 2024**

Winners serve as our elected officials.



#### Important deadlines:

- You must be registered to vote by **October 7**.
- To **vote by mail**, you must submit your application for a mail ballot by **October 25**.\*
- Mail-in ballots must be returned by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day. Find more info and request an application here: <https://my.arizona.vote/Early/ApplicationLogin.aspx>.
- To vote early and in person, go to your polling place from **October 9 to November 1**. (See last page about early voting.)

## MAKE YOUR VOTE COUNT!

### Step 1: Are you eligible to vote?

Generally, you are eligible if you are:

- ✓ At least 18 (by Election Day)
- ✓ A citizen of the United States
- ✓ A resident of Arizona for at least 29 days prior to Election Day.

If you have a first-time felony conviction and have completed your sentence, your voting rights are automatically restored.

If you have multiple felony convictions, **you must petition the court to restore your voting rights.**

# STEP 1: REGISTER TO VOTE

You can register in person at your County Recorder's Office, or you can...

**REGISTER ONLINE:** Register online at <https://servicearizona.com/VoterRegistration/selectLanguage>. You must have a valid Arizona driver's license or non-operating I.D. card issued by the Motor Vehicle Division to register online. If you don't have a valid state ID, you must register by mail or in person.

**REGISTER BY MAIL:** Print this form: [https://azsos.gov/sites/default/files/2023-11/voter\\_registration\\_form\\_092222-standard.pdf](https://azsos.gov/sites/default/files/2023-11/voter_registration_form_092222-standard.pdf). Fill out the form, sign and date it, and mail it to your County Recorder's Office. Include a copy of (1) your birth certificate; (2) passport; (3) Alien Registration Number, Naturalization Certificate Number, or Citizenship Certificate Number; OR (4) Tribal identification number or copy of Tribal identification documents.

## REGISTRATION & ID REQUIREMENTS:

Arizona has two options for voter registration forms—state and federal, each with different requirements. The complicated system stems from decades of dispute over the need for proof of citizenship. Ongoing court cases may change voter registration in Arizona. The state form also requires Documentary Proof of Residency (DPOR) and Documentary Proof of Citizenship (DPOC).

### Documentary Proof of Location of Residence

- Does not require a physical address
- Is satisfied by:
  - An Arizona driver's license or ID card even if it has a P.O. Box
  - Tribal ID — whether or not it has an address
  - For homeless individuals, written attestation of location of residence
  - Certain other documents (bank statements, utility documents, etc.) that contain an address

### Documentary Proof of Citizenship

- Arizona Driver's License/Identification Number: If you have a valid Arizona driver's license or nonoperating identification card issued after October 1, 1996, you should provide the license/identification number in Box 9 on the Arizona Voter Registration Form or register online at [www.servicearizona.com](http://www.servicearizona.com).
- If you do not have an Arizona license, then provide one of the following documents to establish proof of citizenship:
  - Your Indian Census Number, Bureau of Indian Affairs Card Number, Tribal Treaty Card Number, or fill in your Tribal Enrollment Number in Box 10 on the voter registration form.
  - A photocopy of your U.S. naturalization documents or fill in your Alien Registration Number in Box 11 on the voter registration form.
  - A legible photocopy of your birth certificate and supporting legal documentation (i.e., marriage certificate) if the name on the birth certificate is not the same as your current legal name.
  - A legible photocopy of the pertinent pages of your U.S. passport.
  - A legible photocopy of your Tribal Certificate of Indian Blood or Bureau of Indian Affairs Affidavit of Birth.

### **If you register using the state voter registration form...**

- And you provide DPOR and DPOC, then you are registered to vote in federal, state, and local elections (AZ calls these Full Ballot Voters);
- And you cannot provide DPOR, then you are still registered to vote in federal elections but won't be registered for state and local elections;
- And you cannot provide DPOC, then your voter registration form may be rejected due to a recent Supreme Court ruling.

### **If you register using the federal voter registration form...**

- And you cannot provide DPOR and/or DPOC, then you are registered to vote in federal elections, but not state or local elections.

## **STEP 2: GO VOTE**

### **VOTER ID REQUIREMENTS:**

Voter ID is what must be shown when someone goes to vote. You WILL need to show ID to vote in person. Arizona has a voter ID requirement that is separate from the ID requirement(s) to register to vote.

Voters must present either: (1) a valid government ID with photo or address (including a Tribal identification card or other Tribal identification) OR (2) two documents that verify the voter's name and address (such as a utility bill, vehicle registration, or bank statement). **To note: Members of federally recognized Tribes are not required to have an address on their tribal identification in order to cast a provisional ballot.**

You will need to show one form of ID from List #1 **OR** two forms of ID from List #2 **OR** a combination of two IDs from List #3.

**List #1 – Present one of these IDs.** Acceptable forms of photo ID with name and address include:

- Valid Arizona driver license
- Valid Arizona non-operating identification card
- Tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification
- Valid federal, state, or local government-issued identification

**List #2 – Present two of these IDs.** Acceptable forms of non-photo ID with name and address include:

- Utility bill, bank statement, or credit union statement dated within 90 days of the election
- Valid Arizona Vehicle Registration
- Indian Census Card
- Property tax statement of your residence
- Tribal enrollment card or other form of tribal identification
- Arizona vehicle insurance card
- Recorder's Certificate
- Valid federal, state, or local government-issued ID, including a voter registration card issued by the County Recorder
- Any mailing to the elector marked "Official Election Material"

**List #3 – Acceptable combined forms of ID from Lists #1 and #2:**

- Valid photo ID from List 1 with address that does not match the precinct register and non-photo ID from List 2 with address that does reasonably match the precinct register
- U.S. passport without address and one valid item from List 2
- U.S. military identification without address and one valid item from List 2

**VOTERS WITHOUT ID:** If you are unable to provide ID, you will be able to vote a conditional provisional ballot. Conditional provisional ballots are counted only if you present ID at your polling location before 7:00 pm on Election Day or by 5:00 pm at the county elections office within five business days after a general election that includes an election for a federal office and three business days after any other election.

**EARLY VOTING:** Arizona offers early voting. You can choose whether to vote on Election Day or during the early voting period, whichever is easier for you. Early voting is available across the state beginning 27 days before Election Day until the Friday before Election Day. To find the nearest early voting location visit: <https://my.arizona.vote/PortalList.aspx>. Early voting locations may be different from where you would vote on Election Day. Check (<https://azsos.gov/elections/about-elections/elections-procedures/early-voting-procedures>) to find where to vote early.

**RETURNING BALLOTS FOR OTHERS:** Only the voter or the voter's family member, household member, or caregiver may return the voter's ballot. Voters must complete, seal, and sign their own ballots before a caregiver or family member returns it.
